Meditation

Canon Blair W. Schultz

Fr. Andrew writes in his book *Meditations for Every Day*, “Through the lattice of the Blessed Sacrament of the Altar our Lord Jesus Christ looks out on us. The Blessed Sacrament is sometimes said to be ‘the extension of the Incarnation.’ On His last day on earth our Lord left us the wondrous keepsake of the Blessed Sacrament, to be the assurance of His presence and a way by which we can see and handle and make one with ourselves the Word of Life.”¹

This got me to thinking, “If Jesus sees *us* in the Blessed Sacrament, then we must be able to see *Him* in the Blessed Sacrament.” But how?

In the Creed we say that Jesus is,

“God of God,
Light of Light,
Very God of very God . . .
Being of one substance with the Father . . .
Who was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary,
And was made man:”

This is a definition of the Incarnation. Jesus is both God and Man. This is a mystery. And another mystery is this: at the Consecration Jesus becomes ‘incarnate’ in the bread and wine by the Holy Spirit. Jesus is still God and Man, but He is also present in the Sacrament. How this happens we don’t know, but this is what is meant by the Real Presence of Christ in the Sacrament. And it is also what is meant by saying that the Blessed Sacrament is an “extension of the Incarnation.” Jesus’ Incarnation is extend throughout all time to our time by His presence in the Bread and Wine.

Jesus is really and truly present with us in the Bread and Wine, just as He was really and truly present with His disciples 2000 years ago. When we take Holy Communion we “can see and handle and make [ourselves one] with the Word of Life.”

The ACM met on Sunday, May 20. As of April, there is \$1,545 in the ACM treasury. At future meetings, we will need to discuss suggested charitable contributions for 2012.

The ACM will sponsor a "Garage Sale" on Saturday, August 18, with Dan Brush and Bob Oschman as Co-Chairs. Proceeds from this sale will go toward the expense to erect a new All Saints Church sign in the front of the building – masonry construction, with lighted message areas on both sides. The current large sign on Boughton Road will be removed.

To be successful, we will need the support of the parish for donations of glassware, kitchen items, tools, books, clothing, baby items, etc. to sell at the day long event. We will be making a concerted effort to advertise this event in the Bolingbrook area. Complete information on the Garage Sale will be forthcoming in early June.

The second annual Parish Miniature Golf Outing will be held after Mass on Sunday, June 3, at 11:30 a.m. at the Wilderness Trails in Bolingbrook. Cost is \$8.00 per person, which includes 18 holes of mini-golf with pizza and soft drinks afterward in the clubhouse. The sign-up sheet is in the Narthex.

The flagpole in front of the church has been repaired, requiring the replacement of both ropes and metal clips. Dan Brush is dealing with some problems with the Undercroft sump pumps.

Additional evergreen spreaders, red barberry bushes and Korean Boxwood were planted in the parking lot islands in mid-May. Before Memorial Day, the bushes on the east side of the parking lot and those around the building will be trimmed. Our thanks to Carol O'Sullivan and Paul Drayton and his sons, James and Daniel, for their time and work on these projects.

The first Synod of the Diocese of the Atlantic States will be held in early June. We will be contacting the other ACM presidents in "our" new Diocese to share information on projects and activities.

"Let me tell you how to move a mountain "

Back in the 90's, when Gospel music had reached its prime, the song entitled: "Move Mountain," hit the charts! The song talked about moving a mountain by faith.

In our hymnal, the hymn: "Watchman, Tell us of the Night" reinterprets that purpose. In verse one the words: "Traveler, o'er yon mountain's height, see that glory beaming star," tells that the wise men had to move through a mountain in order to follow the star to Bethlehem.

Lately, mountains have started to pop up everywhere. One might say, "How is it possible for a mountain to be present in Chicago?" It is possible through spirituality's connection to the mental parts of our bodies. We face stumbling blocks! These blocks not only happen to us in general, but to our families, friends, and at the top of the list: our Church.

But, let me tell you how to move a mountain.

In Galatians the sixth chapter, Paul tells us in the ninth verse to "not grow weary in well doing, for in due season we will reap the harvest." So what does this have to do with moving a mountain? We are to step out on faith and command the mountains to "get out of my way!" When we feel that the mountain is not moving, it means that we are growing weary. When Christians grow weary, we lose our faith. However, if we obey what Paul said, "in due season" we shall reap of the harvest. Now is the time of harvest and we will obtain our share. But, remember that we must have faith the size of a mustard seed in order to get there.

God has a personalized blessing for each and every one of us that is soon to come (in due season). Paul tells us that whatever you're going through, it's over! Whatever financial restraints you were having, they're over. Whatever problems you were having with other people, they have ceased. Whatever breakthroughs you were praying for, God's already granted your wish.

Do this one favor for me during this season of Pentecost: Tell your friends, loved ones and co-workers to "Hold On because God is in the Blessing Business!"

The Rt. Rev. Otto T. Houston, a bishop and pastor at the historic First Church of Deliverance tells his parishioners every Sunday: "Every time I turn around, I get a

Blessing!" So just know this, when a mountain gets in your way, do a 360° turn and say "mountain, get out of my way," and that mountain will move.

Friends, hold on, don't give up, stay awake, and continue to fight the good fight of faith with all thy might!

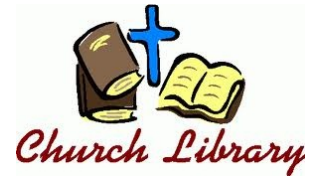
