THE COMMUNION OF SAINTS


'There appeared unto them Elijah with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus' (St Mark ix. 4 - R.V.)

It is probable that the cult of spiritualism has been due to the Church's neglect of practical teaching about the Communion of Saints. In a spiritualistic séance three things are necessary: one is faith in the spiritual world on the part of the inquirer; the second is a tangible medium in this world; and third is what is called a control in the spiritual world. Given these three conditions, a fourth thing is said to become possible; the enquirer has communion with a departed soul. But it is clearly a risky thing to trust a medium one does not know and a control of who one is altogether ignorant, and the whole method of inquiry is something that one naturally shrinks from.

But in this episode of the Transfiguration all these three conditions are present, and present in a way which brings with it security. There was indeed faith in the spiritual world, for a night had been spent in prayer; there was present a Control, for that was our Lord Jesus Christ Himself, the Lord of all worlds; and the apostles themselves became mediums, for they had direct consciousness of Moses and Elias, the departed saints.

We can be sure that those who are nearer to God are not farther from us, when we also come

to Him in prayer. But though the saints love us with that love which nearness to God is always refining and deepening, even their love for us can never be as the love of God for us. So we do not really come to God through them but we have communion with them through God; having come to the King, we find His court around Him.

...... And Now You Know Why

I've been asked several times why I say the following prayer after the Lord's Prayer in Holy Communion:

"Deliver us, we beseech thee, O Lord, from all evils, past, present, and to come: and at the intercession of the blessed and glorious Virgin Mary, Mother of God, with that of thy blessed Apostles, Peter and Paul, and of Andrew and all the Saints, favourably grant peace in our time, that by the help of thy availing mercy, we may ever be kept free from sin, and safe from all disquietude; Through the same Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord, Who with thee, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, liveth and reigneth God, World without end. Amen."

People who ask usually point to Article XXII of the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion which says, "The Romish doctrine concerning . . . [the] invocation of saints, is a fond thing vainly invented, and grounded upon no warranty of Scripture, but rather repugnant to the word of God." Then the person will ask, "Why are you praying to the saints when Article XXII says that praying to the saints is 'repugnant to the word of God'?"

The answer to this question is found in E. J. Bicknell's *A Theological Introduction to the Thirty-Nine Articles*. Bicknell concludes, after extensive analysis, that Article XXII does prohibit the invocation of saints in the public worship of the Church of England. But he goes on to write "The direct invocation of saints does at least bring into practical religious life certain great Christian truths, the reality of the communion of saints and the unseen world, the actuality of life after death" Continuing he writes, "The question is, can these truths have their due practical effect without resorting to [the] invocation [of saints]? An answer may be found in the ancient practice of 'comprecation.' Comprecation,' as opposed to 'invocation,' is the practice of asking God Himself for a share in the prayers of the saints. This is a truly primitive and Catholic practice, found in the ancient Liturgies and open to no possible theological objection. It affirms the truth that the saints do pray for us, it meets the human need for active fellowship with the departed and it brings into the sphere of practical religion the communion of saints as including not only those on earth but those beyond the veil."

As can be seen, the prayer "Deliver us, we beseech thee, O Lord, . . ." known by it's Latin name *Libera nos*, is a prayer to God the Father. The prayer has been part a fixed part of the liturgy at least since the sixth century and may have been used as early as the fifth century. In comparison, while the Lord's Prayer came into use as early as the fourth century, it also didn't become a fixed part of the liturgy until the sixth century. In this prayer we ask God to listen to the intercessions of St. Mary, St. Peter, St. Paul, St. Andrew, and the intercessions of all the Saints. The prayer asks God to "grant us peace in our time, that by the help of thy availing mercy, we may ever be kept free from sin, and safe from all disquietude; . . ." This prayer then meets the practice of "comprecation" and does not conflict with Article XXII of the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion.

Guidelines for Communicants When Receiving Holy Communion at All Saints Anglican Church

(As taken from St. Augustine's Prayer Book and adapted for use at St. George's Anglican Church, Raleigh, North Carolina.

Three times a year is the least that any Christian should receive Holy Communion. A good rule is to receive once a week on a Sunday or other day. The ideal is daily Communion.

It is a sacrilege to receive Holy Communion when one is in a state of serious sin. In order to avoid this, we are commanded by the Apostle, St. Paul, to examine ourselves before receiving. If there is any serious doubt as to our spiritual condition, we should go to confession before receiving the Holy Sacrament.

On receiving Holy Communion, please follow these simple guidelines:

- 1. Women should remove gloves and veils before going to the Altar.
- 2. Genuflect (or bow) in the aisle on leaving your pew. You do not need to genuflect at the Altar rail or after you receive your Communion. Keep your eyes down and your hands joined in going to and from the Altar.
- 3. Go to the Altar rail on the same side of the Church (Epistle or Gospel) on which you are sitting. No crossing over, please.
- 4. Kneel as close to the person on your right (whether on the Epistle or Gospel side of the chancel) so as not to waste room.
- 5. Kneel upright at the rail without leaning over.
- 6. Receive the Lord's Body in one of either of two ways:
 - a. Into the palm of your *right* hand, making the left hand a support for the right, the hands lifted up as high as the lips, if possible. Never take the Host into your fingers or snatch it from the Priest. Consume the Host as soon as it is given to you, unless you wish to receive by intinction, then leave the Host in the palm of your *right* hand. (see #9 below.
 - b. Directly on your tongue. Tip your head well back and extend your tongue over your lower teeth. (This is the only time you're allowed to stick your tongue out at the Priest, Deacons, or even the Bishop). Close your eyes. As soon as the Priest has put the Host on your tongue, withdraw your tongue and close your mouth.
- 7. Do not chew the Sacred Host. It will dissolve quickly.
- 8. Receive the Chalice by guiding it to your lips by the base with your *right* hand only. Take a sip of the Precious Blood. Do not wipe your mouth after receiving the Chalice.
- 9. If you wish to receive by intinction, leave the Host in the palm of your *right* hand. The Priest (or Deacon) will come by, take the Host from you, dip it into the Chalice, and then you receive both the Blessed Body and Blood on your tongue, as described in 6b above.
- 10. Leave the Altar rail as soon as the person on your left has received the Chalice, returning to your pew by way of the side aisles on the side of the Church (Gospel or Epistle) on which your were previously sitting. Again, no crossing over or going back up the main aisle, please.
- 11. When you return to your place in your pew, kneel quietly, beginning your prayers of praise and thanksgiving for the great Gift you have received from God and find the Communion hymn in the hymnal.

Senior Warden's Report

Since the last newsletter, the Vestry met on Sunday, August 18, and Sunday, September 15. A summary of these two meetings is below:

Canon Schultz announced that Jennifer Akinyemi has been appointed Church School Administrator for 2013-2014.

We approved an allocation of up to \$1,000 from the special Altar Guild Fund to purchase two new solid brass urns for flowers in the Sanctuary. Suzanne DeVos is taking care of this purchase.

We approved an amendment to the Guidelines for the Outreach Committee that the recommendations made to the Committee by members of the parish will be considered on the basis of merit as all other requests made for individuals and charitable agencies.

Charles and Libby Bolton and Bob and Chris Oschman were appointed to serve as the Co-chairs of the Annual Parish Christmas Party to be held on Saturday, December 7, at Oak Trace in Downers Grove.

It was noted that 68 adults and children attended the Annual Parish Picnic on Sunday, August 5, at a cost of approximately \$435 for food and supplies and that the Family Miniature Golf Outing on Sunday, September 8, was a success.

We agreed that the ACM will host a theater party on Saturday, October 26, for the evening performance of "Hello Dolly," with dinner afterward, at Drury Lane Theater, Oakbrook, at a cost of \$60 per person. A sign up sheet is available in the Narthex.

With the continuing dry weather, it has been necessary to water the trees and bushes planted last fall and the newly seeded areas in the lawn at the front and east side of the building. Re-seeding of two areas on the west side of the building will be taken care of this fall by Dan Brush. Thanks to Paul Drayton, who assisted with yard maintenance every week during the summer.

We agreed that the Senior Warden will bring in two professional firms for advice and estimates for appropriate treatment for the windows on each side of the organ on the north wall of the Nave, and to report these recommendations to the Vestry at the October meeting.

Canon Schultz announced that at the request of Archbishop Provence and Suffragan Bishop Upton, he will be in Washington, D.C. on October 1 to 3 to interview a candidate for the Deaconate and to discuss Diocese business and plans being made for the 2014 Synod of the Diocese that will be held in May at St. George's Church in Raleigh, North Carolina. In addition, Canon Schultz will be on vacation October 10-17.

It was noted that the last Morning Prayer Service of the year will be held on Saturday, October 5, at 8:30 A.M., with the "Blessing of the Animals" in the parking lot at 9:00 A.M., and a "Dutch treat" breakfast afterwards at the Honey Jam Restaurant across from the church.

Plans are finalized for the official visit of Archbishop Provence the weekend of December 6 to 8. He will attend our Parish Christmas Party and a High Mass and Confirmation will be conducted on Sunday, December 8, with a reception following in the Narthex.

The ACM and ACW will meet after Mass on Sunday, October 13. The collection for our Annual Thanksgiving Basket Project, in cooperation with the Bolingbrook F.I.S.H. organization, will being in October with Chris Oschman as Chair.

Our thanks to Kaycee and Loveth Ekufu for hosting a luncheon for all the parish after Mass on Sunday, September 15. This was a very enjoyable event and greatly appreciated by everyone.

Treasurer's Report

The treasurer's report for the month of September 2013 is as follows:

While our income from pledges to date is below our planned income, all the other income types (open plate, flowers, clergy, coffee hour) are ahead. In August, we spent \$436 on the parish picnic, \$56 on materials for the confirmation class, and we continued to donate \$100 a month to the seminary, and send in a monthly tithe to the Dicoese. The Vestry approved changes to the Dex advertising plan, which will reduce our advertising costs by over \$60 a month.

The second pledge statements with all donations received from the start of the year until the end of August were delivered two weeks ago. If you have not received a pledge statement yet, or would like summary of your donations then please contact me. The final 2013 pledge statements will be delivered in early January of 2014, in time to be used with your 2013 taxes.

We had a CD mature in the church endowment fund in September and the accrued interest from that CD and additional donations were included in a new rollover CD. We changed one of the bond funds in our UBS account, and moved funds from a long maturity bond fund to a short maturity bond fund. This move was to reduce any possible losses in bond fund value due to an increase in interest rates.

The Blessing of Animals

As autumn arrives, people in various places may notice something odd.

A procession of animals, everything from dogs and cats to hamsters and even horses, is led to churches for a special ceremony called the Blessing of Pets.

This custom is conducted in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi's love for all creatures.

Francis, whose feast day is October 4th, loved the larks flying about his hilltop town. He and his early brothers, staying in a small hovel, allowed themselves to be displaced by a donkey.

Francis wrote a Canticle of the Creatures, an ode to God's living things. "All praise to you, Oh Lord, for all these brother and sister creatures." And there was testimony in the cause for St. Clare of Assisi's canonization that referred to her little cat!

That there are today over 62 million cats in the U.S. attests to the continuing affection we have for our furry, feathered or finned friends. We've even had a cat called Socks in the White House. Other popular presidential pets range from Abraham Lincoln's Fido to Lyndon Johnson's beagles, named Him and Her.

For single householders, a pet can be a true companion. Many people arrive home from work to find a furry friend overjoyed at their return. Many a senior has a lap filled with a purring fellow creature.

The bond between person and pet is like no other relationship, because the communication between fellow creatures is at its most basic. Eye-to-eye, a man and his dog, or a woman and her cat, are two creatures of love.

No wonder people enjoy the opportunity to take their animal companions to church for a special blessing. Church is the place where the bond of creation is celebrated.

At Franciscan churches, a friar with brown robe and white cord often welcomes each animal with a special prayer. The Blessing of Pets usually goes like this:

"Blessed are you, Lord God, maker of all living creatures. You called forth fish in the sea, birds in the air and animals on the land. You inspired St. Francis to call all of them his brothers and sisters. We ask you to bless this pet. By the power of your love, enable it to live according to your plan. May we always praise you for all your beauty in creation. Blessed are you, Lord our God, in all your creatures! Amen."

As the prayer is offered, the pet is gently sprinkled with holy water. Believe it or not, most pets receive this sacramental spritz with dignity, though I must admit I have seen some cats flatten their ears a bit as the drops of water lightly pelt them.

But the owner is happy, and who knows what spiritual benefits may result?

Usually the Blessing of Pets is held outdoors. But I remember it rained one year, and all were invited inside St. Stephen's Church in Manhattan. It was quite a sight to see pairs of creatures—one human, one animal—sitting in the pews. The pastor joined right in with his beagle. Noah's Ark was never like this!

Some people criticize the amount and cost of care given to pets. People are more important, they say. Care for poor people instead of poodles. And certainly our needy fellow humans should not be neglected.

However, I believe every creature is important. The love we give to a pet, and receive from a pet, can draw us more deeply into the larger circle of life, into the wonder of our common relationship to our Creator.
